	Universities Life Science Alliance).
	Responsibilities of Advocates as well as helpful information
	related to their roles are recorded in a Runbook which serves as a
	resource for current and future generations of the committee.
	On a regular basis, the BioDocSoc consults SBS PDRAs and other
	key stakeholders and compiles objectives and plans activities
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which are also recorded in the Runbook. Advocates share information and resources with the SBS PDRA community through an online, accessible community space ('SBS Postdocs' on Microsoft Teams), and through monthly events and seminars with invited speakers which are supported by the School.
